Strategic Overview

It gives me great pleasure to introduce this years Annual Report, which reflects the significant achievements delivered by CHIC, CHIP and our partners across 2024/25. Once again, the results show the power of collaboration in creating opportunities, improving lives and strengthening communities.

Through our seven Local Employment Group partnerships 290 individuals were supported into training, qualifications and employment pathways. This included 126 people moving directly into jobs and a further 164 progressing into training or qualifications. These outcomes highlight our shared commitment to breaking down barriers for those facing disadvantage, including young people, ex-offenders and individuals at risk of homelessness.

The Community Chest Fund has also played an important role, distributing £50,000 across 15 organisations, enabling grassroots groups to deliver projects that improve wellbeing, tackle inequality and promote resilience where it is most needed.

Equally inspiring is the contribution of the CHIC team and partners, who gave an incredible 1,358 hours through the Corporate Volunteering Programme, supporting local communities in practical and meaningful ways. Alongside this our fundraising events, the CHIP Awards Dinner and Sponsored Walk, raised additional resources to extend our reach and impact. I am deeply proud of these achievements and grateful to everyone who has contributed to another outstanding year.

CHIC members spent £286m through CHIC procured contracts in 2024/25. Social added value created by this investment of £36.4m equals to 13% of the investment in residents homes. This communities have therefore benefited more widely from their landlords contracts procured through CHIC.

Contractual Commitments

Every contract procured through CHIC is required to reinvest at least 1% of its turnover back into social value within the member's local area. Each year this commitment creates meaningful outcomes through our partners, who deliver a wide variety of initiatives, as summarised above.

To showcase the fantastic results being achieved, we rely on our suppliers to share details of the social value activities they deliver. Without this information we are unable to report fully on outcomes or capture the true impact being made in peoples lives, communities and local economies.

In 2024/25 we received outcome reports from 53% of our suppliers, up from 30.5% in the previous year. These provided feedback for 78% of 858 contracts. Looking ahead, we hope even more of our partners will join us in building on these results, so together we can demonstrate and grow the positive impact of CHIC's work.

Bounce Back

CHIP funded bounce back to support 20 ex-offenders in a variety of training opportunities, ranging from short skills-based programmes to qualifications such as the CSCS card.

Jericho

CHIP funded 10 learners who began a Level 2 Customer Service Apprenticeship. This funding helps open the door to further training, higher level qualifications and future employment opportunities.

The Guinness Partnership

CHIP funded 150 young people to complete the Rio Ferdinand Foundation course, which help build confidence, develop new skills and create pathways into training, education and employment.

Local Employment Groups CHIP Supports

St Giles

CHIP funded 104 individuals of which 24 supported with short, work focused training, 40 individuals HMP Oakwood with support into employment with workshops to boost employability skills and confidence for training and work.

Black Country Housing Group

CHIP funded 3 individuals to complete a Level 2 Apprenticeship in Retail or Customer Service. This commitment is designed to support pathways into further training, higher level qualifications and sustainable employment.

St Basils

CHIP funded 24 young people at risk of homelessness to access access short courses and one to one guidance, helping them move towards employment and greater stability.

This year CHIP has funded seven organisations, all dedicated to helping disadvantaged individuals find pathways into employment. Those who have received support include young people not in education, ex-offenders, jobseekers over 55, ex-military personnel, young people affected by crime or homelessness and individuals experiencing mental health challenges and social deprivation.

BESAS Case Study

This year, CHIP launched a new partnership with BESAS, a consortium of not for profit apprenticeship organisations operating in the built environment sector. The collaboration brings together the expertise of EN:Able Futures, TrAC, CoTrain, Shared Apprenticeships and Evolve, delivering apprenticeship schemes across England.

CHIP wanted to create a programme with a direct impact on the communities where CHIC's members are based. We prioritised enrolment for individuals who either live in our members communities or are the residents of one of our members.

In 2024/25, this funding enabled 19 young people to start apprenticeships, across Level 2, 3, and 4 courses in Horticulture, Joinery, Painting & Decorating, Roofing, Engineering and Countryside Management.

CHIP is proud to support this initiative, celebrating the learners' enthusiasm and commitment across such a wide range of courses. We look forward to continuing our partnership with BESAS in 2025/26.







At CHIP, we are dedicated to supporting the wellbeing of local communities. Through our Community Chest Fund, we offer grants to community groups and projects that make a tangible, positive impact on peoples lives.

The fund is open to local groups connected to CHIC's members. There is no set project model, what matters is a clear vision and measurable benefits for the community. Grants of up to £10,000 are available.

Applications are reviewed by CHIP's Trustees who determine what support can be offered. Supporting documents are provided to guide applicants through each step of the process.

Case Study - EACS

In 2024, Mile Rainbow working in London applied for funding to support their East Asian Cultural Salon (EACS), which empowers marginalised communities, particularly those facing high deprivation and unemployment, through cultural and physical activities that promote social inclusion and community engagement.

Their innovative Emotional Vaccine (EV) programme takes a proactive approach, going beyond traditional one on one therapy. Delivered through interactive group workshops, EV helps participants build emotional resilience and immunity, preventing everyday stress from developing into more serious physical or mental health challenges.

EACS aims to boost physical activity and enhance emotional well being among marginalised participants through activities such as dance and calligraphy, with 81% of participants reporting feeling more positive and happier. EACS targeted 7–15 participants per session, reaching a total of 35-75 participants across all sessions, with 8-10 out of 10 expressing a willingness to recommend the programme to others.

Following the project's success, Mile Rainbow received wide recognition for their social impact and innovation in the health and wellbeing sector.
